April Meeting Presenter: Gordon Nealy

Gordon will be presenting his polyurethane artwork. He will cover a little theory and information for why he began using the media. Several small paintings and several large paintings will be on display. In addition, he will give a brief demonstration of how he creates alow-relief polyurethane canvas and pouring.

Gordon started drawing when he was eight, copying other drawings and illustrations from magazines. Those were his incipient efforts. Architectural drawing and a few art classes entertained his art interests in high school. Then in college, he changed his major and dove into art. He completed a five year degree in sculpture, and continued making art whilst he was employed.



As time went by his work matured, and he exhibited in various venues from restaurants to galleries. He won awards along the way, joined a collective in Seattle, and became more prolific. His angst infused non-figurative work moved toward a more controlled expression. The polyurethane paintings walk the line between the two. Making art in both painting and sculpture satisfies his interest in visual challenges. He lives to explore and experiment which always generates new problems.



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An Essay: Metaphor (continued)

Metaphors are widely used in poetry, literature, everyday speech, and even advertising to make language more engaging and impactful.

Metaphors are effective because they make language more vivid, engaging, and easier to understand. Here's why they work so well.

Metaphors create mental pictures, making abstract or complex ideas more concrete. For example, saying "the world is a stage" helps people visualize life as a performance in which everyone plays a role.

Metaphors connect with our emotions, associating one thing with something more familiar or powerful. "Her heart is a stone" conveys coldness or a lack of emotion more strongly than simply saying she is unemotional. People remember metaphors better than plain statements because they create striking, unique comparisons. A metaphor like "a blanket of snow" is more memorable than just saying "it snowed a lot."

Metaphors help explain difficult concepts by relating them to something more familiar. In science, we use the metaphor "the brain is a computer" to explain how the brain processes information.

More poetic. Metaphors encourage people to think beyond literal meanings; they invite interpretation and deepen one's consideration of the message. This is particularly true in the arts.

Artists use metaphors to add depth, emotion, and meaning to their work. Metaphors allow them to express complex ideas in a powerful and imaginative way. Metaphors allow artists to convey ideas that go beyond literal interpretation. For example, in poetry, "a caged bird", (as in Maya Angelou's, *I Know Why the Caged Bird Sings*) represents oppression and a desire for freedom. Metaphors trigger emotional responses by associating feelings with experiences we are familiar with. A song lyric like "*Love is a Battlefield*" (Pat Benatar) makes the struggles of love feel more dramatic and intense.

Metaphors open the door to interpretation, asking us to think more deeply about the meaning of the particular work. For example, when combined with understandings of semiology, a painting of a stormy sea might symbolize inner turmoil or change. A viewer might connect with it in personal ways. Surrealism is a more extreme example of metaphor but on a very different level. Artists often deal with abstract themes like love, fear, or time, translating these themes into relatable images. For instance, in visual art, for years I have used a withering flower to symbolize the passage of time or lost youth and issues regarding death.

Metaphors make art more distinctive and poetic. Shakespeare's famous metaphor, "All the world's a stage" (from As You Like It), remains memorable because it provides a wider perspective on life. Poetic expression is not limited to words; as others have said, a picture is worth a thousand words. As artists, we often use metaphors to question societal norms or present new perspectives. By using metaphors, artists transform ordinary language and imagery into something profound, making their work more impactful and timeless. Surrealism, for example, is much older than the 20th-century Manifeste du surréalisme published by André Breton in 1924. Da Vinci's Mona Lisa is an example.

Finally, the term artist is not inherently a metaphor, but it can be used metaphorically in certain contexts. Literally, an artist is someone who creates art—whether it's painting, music, literature, or other forms of creative expression. However, while I prefer other more accurate descriptions, the word is often used metaphorically to describe someone who excels in their craft or brings creativity and skill to their work, even outside traditional artistic fields.

- A chef might be called an artist in the kitchen.
- A great basketball player might be described as an artist on the court.

In these cases, the word "artist" is used metaphorically to suggest mastery, creativity, or finesse in a particular domain.
